As we yield to God, we are resisting the devil.

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
Esther 3:1-9


- Esther 1 – Vashti is deposed for failure to come to King Xerxes wearing only her royal crown to display her beauty to his guests.
- Esther 2 – they started looking for a new queen.
 - Verse 5 – we meet Mordecai, from the tribe of Benjamin. He was in Susa. He was carried into exile from Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon.
 - Verse 7 – we meet his cousin Hadassah who he raised because she was an orphan.
 - Verse 8 – we are told that she was taken into the palace to be among those under consideration for the queen.

- Esther 2 – they started looking for a new queen.
 - Verse 10 – we learn something about their relationship. Mordecai told Esther not to reveal her nationality (she was passing)
 - Verse 11 – Mordecai went to check on Esther daily at the courtyard near the harem.
 - Verse 17 – Esther is chosen as queen.
 - Verse 21 & 22 – Mordecai is now at the king's gate. He learns of a conspiracy to kill the king, and he tells Esther.


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The Agagites were

Mordecai is not the only person in the Bible who, for conscience sake, practiced “civil disobedience.”


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- The Hebrew midwives disobeyed Pharaoh's orders and refused to kill the Jewish babies. (Ex. 1:15-22)
 - Daniel and his three friends refused to bow down to Nebuchadnezzar's image (Dan. 3)
 - The apostles refused to stop witnessing in Jerusalem and affirmed:
"We must obey God rather than humans" (Acts 5:29)

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Mordecai didn't reveal his Jewish heritage until he was pressed.


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Mordecai couldn't be a secret Jew forever! You can't be a secret disciple either!

He went and told three truths and a lie.

- Dispersed = Geographically spread through the empire.
- Separate = Unassimilated.


Separate

- The word for “separate” here refers to being set apart.
- They are “Qodesh” which is most commonly translated “holy.”


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- Psalm 1:1 “Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked or stand in the way that sinners take or sit in the company of mockers.”
 - Deuteronomy 14:12 – “For you are a people holy to the Lord your God, and the Lord has chosen you to be a people for his treasured possession, out of all the peoples who are on the face of the earth.”

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Esther 4:1 – 3

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Tearing of clothes and putting on sackcloth and ashes is an outward expression of faith.

The Fourfold Answer of Mordecai to Esther

1. He sent word of all that had happened to him.
2. He told Esther about the money that Haman had promised to pay the king.
3. He sent Esther a copy of the decree.
4. He said that Esther should go into the king, to make supplication and request before him, for her people.

Mordecai reminded Esther of 3 facts.

- Her position was not a guarantee that she would be spared.
- Silence wouldn't prevent another source of being used.
- She wasn't in that palace by accident.



Mordecai literally spoke truth to power.




When we choose to fight, it will change

Mordecai fighting back led Esther to become
the queen that she was meant to be.
